ELWOOD TEAM PASSES TO VICTORY OVER THE MILLERS 33 TO 7

BAXTER FEATURES VISITING TEAM'S OFFENSIVE, IN EVERY KIND OF PLAY

Visitors Use Forward Pass

MILLERS PRESENT PATCHED UP TEAM TO OPPOSE INVADERS.

After displaying an opening minutes offensive, which netted a touch down on three plays, and a quick lead of seven to nothing, the Noblesville football team slowly lost its ability to dent the opposing line consistently, and gradually sunk to a 33 to 7 defeat at the hands of the invading Elwood eleven. Elwood's strength lay in her ability to forward pass, with Baxter on the receiving end, and in Baxter's sweeping end runs with splendid interference. Noblesville intercepted a few attempted passes, but were unable on the whole, to stop Elwood's plays. The Miller backs plunged thru Elwood's line with success, but they did not have the staying power to carry through to touchdowns. Four Miller passes fell safely into the hands of the forwards.

The last two weeks scrimmage, and the opening game with Kokomo, resulted in serious injuries to several of Coach Hough's mainstays, and he was obliged to keep many of his first string players on the bench. Everyone is confident that a much better team and much better results will come to Hough's squad as the season progresses. There is material there for a team that can make good showings in any of the games on our schedule, and we are confident that the worst of the season is over. We are going to have some victories in the games that are to be played.
